June 16 - Flag Day

In 1916, President Woodrow Wilson issued an official decree making June 14 Flag Day; however, some say the original Flag Day occurred in Wisconsin in 1885 when Bernard J. Cigrand, a teacher, began the practice of celebrating the flag's birthday. Flag Day, June 14 is a day for all Americans to celebrate and show respect for our flag that is representative of our independence and our unity as a nation... "one nation, under God, indivisible." Our flag has a proud and glorious history, and we have every right to be proud of our culture, our nation, and our flag. So raise the flag on June 14 and every day with pride!



Flag Etiquette

Fly the flag:

- In the morning by raising the flag briskly.
- At sunset by lowering it slowly. Always, raise and lower it ceremoniously.
- At night with a light on it.
- After a tragedy or death, at half-staff for 30 days. It is called "half-staff" on land, and "half-mast" on a ship.
- Vertically on a pole, the stars and blue field or "union," is at the top.
- And never let your flag touch the ground, never...period.

June 19 - Juneteenth Day

Juneteenth or Freedom Day celebrates and symbolizes the end of slavery in the United States. President Abraham Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation on September 22, 1862, but it was not until June 19, 1865, that all slaves experienced freedom. General Gordon Granger rode into Galveston, Texas, with his troops and issued Order Number 3, which freed the last of the slaves. The passing of the thirteenth amendment of the Constitution marked the formal end of slavery in the United States.
